What are Noxious Weeds? Noxious weeds are non-native plants that aggressively spread and outcompete native vegetation. These plants can harm biodiversity, degrade natural habitats, reduce crop yields, and create challenges for landowners and farmers. The main noxious weeds in our area include **leafy spurge**, **Canada thistle**, and **spotted knap weed**.

Why Should We Be Concerned? Noxious weeds have the potential to cause significant ecological and economic damage if left unchecked. They can invade natural areas, agricultural fields, pastures, roadsides, and other landscapes, displacing native plants and disrupting ecosystems. Additionally, some noxious weeds are toxic to humans and animals, posing health risks if ingested.

What Can You Do? We all have a role to play in controlling the spread of noxious weeds. Here are some actions you can take:


- * Learn to identify noxious weeds commonly found in our area.
- * Monitor your property regularly for signs of noxious weed infestations.
- * Take appropriate measures to control and manage noxious weeds on your property, such as mowing, hand-pulling, or using herbicides.
- * Report sightings of noxious weeds on public property or rights-of-way to City Hall.



What is the City Doing? The City is committed to addressing the issue of noxious weeds and protecting our natural environment. We work closely with county and state agencies to implement weed management programs, provide educational resources to residents, and enforce regulations related to noxious weed control.
