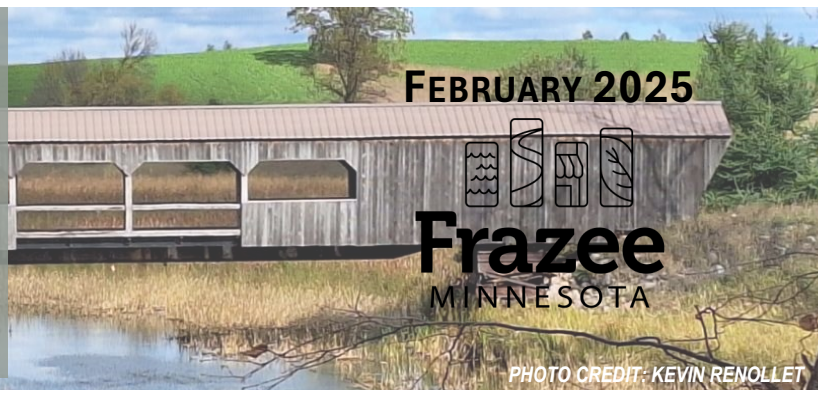




2025 Dog Licenses

Annually, dog owners must obtain a license for all dogs over the age of three (3) months. Bring a certificate from your veterinarian showing your dog is current on their rabies vaccine.

License fee: \$10/per dog, payable by cash or check.

Think your flushable wipes are safe to flush? Think again! Just because they're marketed as 'flushable,' doesn't mean they break down like toilet paper. These wipes **DON'T BREAK DOWN** when flushed and they **clog pipes, damage wastewater treatment plants, and harm the environment.** It is time to put an end to the myth - "flushable" wipes should not be flushed. Dispose of wipes properly in the trash, not the toilet!

Labels like "flushable," "septic-safe," or "sewer-safe" are misleading. No wipes should ever be flushed. Disposable wipes used for changing diapers, personal hygiene, housecleaning, and more—cause **major problems** when flushed. Flushing them is like flushing a handkerchief or other item made of cloth. Simply put, Community sewer systems and treatment plants were never designed to handle them. According to the **Minnesota Pollution Control Agency** these so-called "flushable" wipes **gum up the system, clog pipes and pumps and will cost taxpayers and residents millions** in repair and maintenance costs.

Communities nation wide are facing the same issue - "flushable" wipes are wreaking havoc on both home plumbing and public sewer systems. **Residents, we need your help!** Wipes CLOG pipes, please **DON'T FLUSH!** Let's protect our infrastructure and keep our systems running smoothly by properly disposing of wipes in the trash.
